EMERGENCIES



The ICRC works together with the Indonesian Red Cross (PMI) in providing humanitarian responses worth of CHF 500,000 in Lombok and Central Sulawesi.

1,000 shelter toolkits, 5,000 mosquito nets, 36,000 roofing sheets, 15 portable generators, 17,988 forensic tools, and 4 RFL kits. The ICRC also trained 85 people on forensic and 41 PMI volunteers on Restoring Family Links.



HUMANITARIAN DIPLOMACY

On 5 September 2018 in partnership with the Indonesian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the ICRC organized a regional conference on contemporary warfare in Jakarta that was attended by close to 150 experts who examined trends in modern-day conflicts and the threats posed by new weapons and technologies.

From 8 to 9 March 2018, over 120 participants from 18 countries gathered in Jakarta, Indonesia for the Regional Conference on Humanitarian Action and Negotiation in Asia organized in conjunction with the Centre of Competence on Humanitarian Negotiation (CCHN), Humanitarian Forum Indonesia (HFI) and Paramadina University.
