
HUMANITARIAN CONCERNS AND RESPONSE IN THE PHILIPPINES

The year 2015 was challenging for the Philippines due to several internal armed conflicts and other situations of violence that led to the displacement of around 100,000 civilians, mainly in Mindanao. Typhoons have also brought significant humanitarian consequences in some parts of the country.

The level of conflict-related incidents was slightly higher than in 2014. The ICRC, a neutral, impartial and independent humanitarian organization, was concerned by the almost daily occurrence of attacks and encounters, arrests, summary executions and improvised explosive devices mainly in Central and Eastern Mindanao, and the Sulu Archipelago, but also in Sorsogon Province in Region 5 and Samar in Region 8.

The ICRC has increased its confidential dialogue with all parties to the conflicts in relation to the respect for international humanitarian law. Its priorities have included building the resilience of communities affected by chronic armed conflicts through various projects; supporting the authorities to address the causes and consequences of extreme jail overcrowding; and enhancing the capacity of the Philippine Red Cross (PRC), its primary operational partner, to help people affected by man-made and natural disasters.

Other consequences of displacement:

limited or no access to food, clean water, sanitation, healthcare services, as well as livelihood and education













As of November 2015, the national congestion rate in detention facilities managed by the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology, which goes up to 2,361% in the most congested jail. A total of 96,551 inmates were detained

in 464 jails that should ideally hold approximately 19,000.

the PRC through food rations, household and hygiene items, clean water, and access to health care and sanitation facilities

Life-saving support during emergencies

healthcare staff from North Cotabato, Agusan del Sur, and Maguindanao trained in First Aid

and Basic Life Support from April to September.

The trainings conducted by the ICRC and PRC aimed to boost the local government units' capacity to respond in emergencies such as disasters, armed conflict, and other situations of violence.

Overcoming jail congestion and its consequences for health and living conditions

19,605 inmates underwent mass screening for tuberculosis, as part of early case-detection efforts in two ICRC pilot sites

52 jail staff underwent training/workshops on database management and jail design; and paralegal decongestion action plan



Promoting international humanitarian law

2,585 weapon bearers (state and nonstate) participated in trainings or sessions to increase their awareness and understanding of international humanitarian law

the PRC for distribution to Typhoon Koppu (Lando) victims in northern Luzon

1,263 families or 6,315 people affected by Typhoon Haiyan (Yolanda) in Samar received individual latrines and complementary training sessions on hygiene and sanitation
