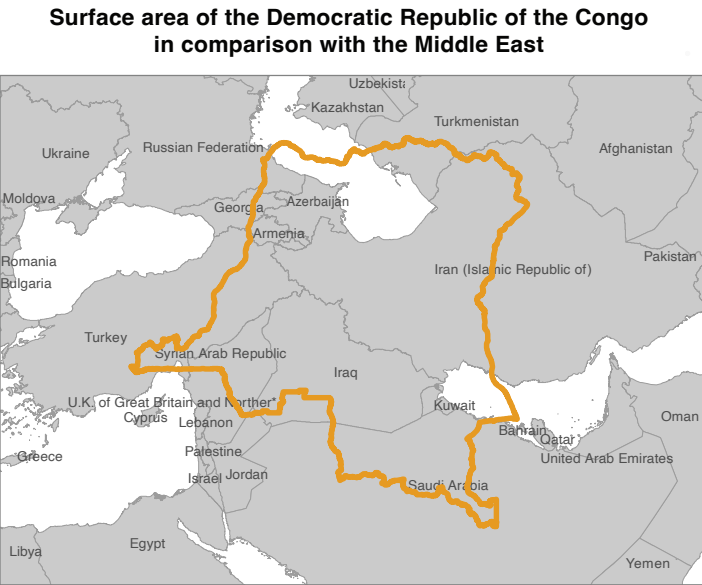

ICRC ACTIVITIES FROM JANUARY TO DECEMBER 2021

The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) in the Democratic Republic of the Congo promotes respect for international humanitarian law and helps people affected by conflict and violence to become self-sufficient, often in cooperation with the Red Cross Society of the Democratic Republic of the Congo. We also work to improve water supply and sanitation facilities, reunite separated family members and strengthen the provision of health care for sick and wounded people, and victims of sexual violence.
