SUPPORTING HEALTH CARE



HOSPITALS

with a capacity of 7,057 beds, serving 26 million people, supported through the payment of salaries to 10,483 health workers and covering the running cost

benefited from medical consultations at the 33 ICRC-supported hospitals

STUDENTS,

mainly nurses and midwives, graduated from the 9 Health Institute of Science supported by ICRC

mainly victims of unexploded ordnances, were transported to hospitals through ICRC paid taxi service

SACHETS

IMPROVING CONDITIONS OF DETENTION



26

VISITS

made to 17 places of detention holding 6,921 detainees



DETAINEES

in 48 places of detention benefited from improved living conditions through the provision of fuel, oil and hygiene items as well as infrastructure repairs



10,000

DETAINEES

received food and hygiene items on a monthly basis in 8 prisons and the OPA and prison authorities had their capacities on food chain management built



DETAINEES

received items such as warm blankets, patous and shawls and mattresses



Reactivated prison health sub-working group meetings (on the central level) and Provincial Prison Health Committee meetings in Herat and Ghazni prisons



Gave financial, logistical and technical support to MoPH for implementing the prison health services package in Herat and Sarpoza provincial prisons, where 20,397 consultations were provided to 3,467 detainees



Supported the authorities in organizing mass TB screening campaigns in Helmand and Farah provincial prisons (housing 1,758 detainees)



Provided physical rehabilitation services to detainees with disabilities in the prisons in Kabul, Parwan, Herat, Jalalabad, Mazar-i-Sharif, Badakhshan and Lashkar Gah

RESTORING AND MAINTAINING FAMILY LINKS

minors were reunited with their families abroad with the help of the local Red Cross Society and International Organization for Migration

calls facilitated between detainees held at the Guantanamo Bay Internment Facility and their families in Afghanistan



RED CROSS MESSAGES

and 11 SALAMAT (short oral messages) exchanged between detainees and their families and 91 Red Cross messages were collected from or distributed to civilians

of missing people were resolved and their whereabouts ascertained

PROTECTION OF CIVILIAN POPULATION



The ICRC continued to monitor the situation affecting the people in Afghanistan. Whenever applicable, concerns can be raised with relevant actors. The ICRC also organized informal group discussions with communities affected by the situation, who are facing protection concerns (whose lives and dignity are at risk)

DIGNIFIED MANAGEMENT OF THE DEAD



SETS

of mortal remains of fighters and civilians retrieved, transferred and returned to their families and communities with the support of the Afghan Red Crescent Society and ICRC-contracted taxi drivers under the Human Remains Transfer Programme



Salary support for Forensic service providers through a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Public Health, covering the salaries of 144 Forensic practitioners from 9 Forensic Medicine Departments from January to March 2022



FORENSIC SPECIALISTS

from 11 Forensic Medicine Departments attended Forensic Specialization training sessions on examination, identification and documentation of human remains, organized in Kabul and Jalalabad in cooperation with the Medico-Legal Directorate Kabul



FORENSIC CAPACITY BUILDING **TASK FORCE**

created in cooperation with the Medico-Legal Directorate Kabul to reinforce the forensic capacities countrywide

PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT ITEMS,

including surgical masks, rubber gloves, boots, body bags and disinfection equipment donated to 11 Forensic Departments involved in the management of human remains

ASSISTANCE TO COMMUNITIES

(73,530 individuals) received multipurpose cash assistance to meet their basic needs

households (86,408 individuals) received cash grants to restore their livelihood

for work project implemented - 208 community workers earned income and up to 9,950 farmers gained improved access to irrigation

in Kabul, Farah, Herat, Kandahar, Uruzgan, Zabul, Hilmand, Balkh, Kunduz received better electricity supply owing to the donation of 559,649 litres fuel and 11,680 litres of oil to DABS

PEOPLE

in Badakhshan, Faryab, Samangan, Kandahar, Farah, Helmand, Nimrouz, Badghis, Ghazni, Nangarhar, Kabul, Khost, Parwan, Herat and Qala-e-Naw got better access to water owing to new or revamped water towers and supply networks, and donation of fuel, oil, chlorine, equipment and spare parts

5,000 patous for men, 1,000 shawls for women and 900 jackets for children donated to ARCS for earthquake victims in Paktika and Khost

ARCS BASIC HEALTH CENTRES

benefited from ICRC rehabilitation services for 675 patients per day. Repaired a PCR test room by installing PVC partitions, standard ventilation system and electrical works at an ARCS COVID-19 hospital (with 50 beds) in Tahia-e-Maskan
