# THE ICRC IN SUDAN

## FACTS AND FIGURES 2022

### JANUARY TO DECEMBER 2022

The ICRC has been present in Sudan since 1978, helping people affected by the conflict in Darfur, Blue Nile, South Kordofan, and East Sudan and promoting International Humanitarian Law (IHL). Our work today, independently or in cooperation with the Sudanese Red Crescent Society (SRCS), includes supporting hospitals and health facilities with equipment and supplies, working with local water authorities on improving people's access to clean water, and supporting the authorities who provide rehabilitation services for people with disabilities. We provide displaced people in conflict-affected areas with emergency assistance, distribute seeds and tools to farmers, and vaccinate pastoralists' livestock against diseases. We are helping families separated by conflict or displacement keep in touch with their loved ones, and we have facilitated the release of detainees upon request of the parties and supported them with some basic assistance such as clothes and resources for their return to their area of origin.

**1148** Red Cross Messages exchanged.



**1998** Tracing Requests collected from abroad and within Sudan.



**489** Tracing Requests closed positively.



**176** Minors and vulnerable persons newly registered.



**3** Minors registered in Sudan reunited with their families (**1** within Sudan and **2** abroad) while **2** Minors and their mother registered abroad reunited with their family in Sudan.



**75** Red Cross Messages and **64** oral messages/salamats collected and distributed across **9** places of detention.



**673** Photos collected in White Nile published in booklets which will be used in Restoring Family Links.

## Promoting International Humanitarian Law (IHL)



**3,251** Members of state and non-state armed groups trained on IHL.



HCiD roundtable organized with **22** representatives of relevant ministries and institutions to discuss the law for the protection of healthcare, gaps, challenges and steps forward.



**25** Legal advisers and staff of the Ministry of Justice trained on IHL.



**2** Diplomats representing Sudan participated in the IHL Regional Course for Arab Diplomats in Abu Dhabi.



**2,400** Participants from Police, Army, Intelligence Services, and non-state armed groups signatories to Juba Peace Agreement sensitized on IHL.



**36** Journalists and social media influencers trained on IHL basics.



**2** Senior officers, one from the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and one from the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) attended the 15th Senior Workshop on International Rules governing Military Operations (SWIRMO) in Denpasar, Indonesia.

## Economic Security



**84,000** Individuals benefited from the distribution of in-kind seeds and tools to increase their food production and household food consumption. All families who received the agro support received also food rations for a month.



**109,992** Individuals received each SDG **50,000** for agriculture activities.



**66,124** Vulnerable individuals benefited from the ICRC Essential Household Items (EHI) as part of the emergency relief support for displaced families.



More than **2,000** Volunteers of SRCs were involved in the EcoSec activities.



**2,400** Individuals benefited with temporary income through cash for work.



The ICRC implemented a seed multiplication project in partnership with Nyala Agriculture Research Centre (NARS) to improve the availability and access to certified seeds at state level.



In partnership with the Ministry of Animal Resources and Fisheries (MARF), **967,615** animals vaccinated against the main livestock epidemic diseases.



**133,632** Individuals were assisted with multipurpose cash grants to enable them access to basic family needs.



**1,890** Vulnerable individuals in the ICRC supported physical rehabilitation program received business skills training followed by the Micro Economic Initiatives (MEI) grants to continue or start small income generating activities.

## Water and Habitat



**600,279** People benefited from construction, upgrading and repairing of water systems in urban and rural settings. Priority was given to the prevention of water-borne diseases.



**7** Health structures (clinics or hospitals) benefited from rehabilitation works involving construction, water supply, sanitation and electrification by solar systems.



**30,000** People benefited from urgent support with chemicals for water treatment during the rainy season in response to floods.



**4** Places of detention (PoD) received infrastructural support in water, sanitation and electricity. In addition, vector control campaigns were done in **5** PoDs.



More than **290** SRCS volunteers participated in trainings in water chlorination and hygiene promotion. With SRCS volunteers, cleaning and vector control campaigns were carried out in various public spaces.

## Supporting Persons with Disability



**3,651** Services were provided by the **08** PRP supported Physical Rehabilitation Centers (PRCs). Services included delivery of **1,063** prosthetics, **514** orthotics, **198** walking aids, **37** wheelchairs and **2,128** physiotherapy services.



**26** Service Users were referred from the **5** States of Darfur and from West Kordofan State, for rehabilitation services in Nyala Rehabilitation Centre.



**27** Mine victims were serviced in ICRC supported PRCs in Damazine and Kadugli as a result of collaboration between ICRC, NAPO and JASMAR.



**12** Participants from NAPO PRCs and technical staff of PRP attended the Stock Management Training.



**10** Participants from NAPO clinical staff attended the Spinal Rehabilitation Training.














**44** Students are undergoing the Diploma and BSc. Degree training programs in Prosthetics and Orthotics at Al Neelain University, supported by ICRC with coordination, material and financial assistance.













**91** of PRP Service Users benefited from the Micro Economic Initiative program.

## Providing Health

-  **122** Weapon wounded kit sets distributed to **26** hospitals across Sudan, enough to treat **5,100** weapon wounded.
-  **23** Intra agency emergency health kits (IEHK) distributed to **11** Primary health care centers to support various State Ministry of health to provide curative care to displaced people and returnees.
-  **6,543** Patients benefited from emergency services in the ICRC supported Hospital in Kassala.
-  **202** People including arm carriers, health personnel, SRCS volunteers and civilians trained in First Aid
-  **48** SRCS volunteers benefited from training on health education and community awareness.
-  **2,430** Women delivered in **6** ICRC supported primary health care centers.
-  **69,967** Curative and preventive consultations were provided in **6** ICRC supported primary health centers.
-  **9,005** Pregnant women benefited from antenatal consultations in the ICRC supported PHCC.
-  **72** SRCS volunteers supported ICRC primary health care activities through outreach community awareness and immunization activities.
-  In Response to the Covid-19 pandemic, the ICRC supported the Federal ministry of Health with **2,662,300** needles and **14,800** safety containers. It supported **05** Covid-19 vaccination campaigns in BNS and ND and reached **57,593** persons.
-  The ICRC supported disease (Dengue fever, Malaria and Hepatitis E) outbreak response in ND with provisions of drugs and consumables.

## Strengthening Capacities of the Sudanese Red Crescent Society (SRCS)

-  **7** Annual agreements signed between **5** ICRC -SRCS operational departments and **2** on finance management, under the umbrella of the Partnership Framework Agreement (PFA).
-  **18** SRCS branches and Khartoum HQ received financial support to upgrade their Finance, Human Resource and Logistics systems and to improve their internet connectivity.
-  **6** SRCS branches and Khartoum HQ received support to prepare for SRCS local elections, General Assembly and review of SRCS statutes and internal regulations.
-  **11** SRCS branches and Khartoum HQ received financial support for the daily functioning of their office and for contributing to **45** SRCS staff salaries.
-  **45** Volunteers of SRCS were trained on communication skills in **3** different regions.
-  **3,000** SRCS active volunteers have been supported into global accident insurance.
-  **36** Coordination events took place with SRCS HQ and Branches to facilitate joint operations.
-  **700** SRCS volunteers from **8** different SRCS Branches supported ICRC assistance interventions.
-  **1,200** SRCS volunteers received protection and visibility materials, **113** SRCS deployed volunteers received incentives, **48** SRCS staff and volunteers received training on Safer Access, **4** SRCS vehicles were repaired, and **2** SRCS branch received support to strengthen passive security.
-  **240** Volunteers were trained in effective emergency response, **18** First Aid trainers received a refresher training, **160** volunteers received Basic First Aid training.

We help people around the world affected by armed conflict and other situations of violence, doing everything we can to protect their lives and dignity and to relieve their suffering, often with our Red Cross and Red Crescent partners. We also seek to prevent hardship by promoting and strengthening humanitarian law and championing universal humanitarian principles.
