





REHABILITATION OF ESSENTIAL INFRASTRUCTURE


 Over **335 tons of assistance** was provided for operational maintenance of the **LuganskVoda**, including **1 excavator**, **1 water truck** and more than **10 km of pipes** to preserve **access to water supply** for the population.

 Over **14 tons of materials**, including **30 electric generators** were provided to the Department of **Emergency Situations** of Luhansk to assist its emergency response efforts.

 Over **11 tons of emergency materials** such as tarpaulin, film, wood, rope, plywood and repair tools were delivered to the **affected population** to enable them to **fix their houses**.

 **Structural support** was provided to a **Pumping station** in Luhansk and Western **Filtration station** in Stakhanov by replacing roofs and windows to ensure **continuity of the water supply** services.


ENSURING LIFESAVING CARE & OTHER HEALTH SERVICES

 **7 specialized medical facilities** overseeing the **treatment of wounded civilians** along the frontline received a donation of material, including **war wounded kits** with the capacity to treat more than **3,000 patients**. The facilities also received tools, consumables and personal protective equipment to cover their daily work.

 **13,000 blood bags** were **donated** to the **blood bank** of Luhansk.


 Over **2,500 diabetic patients** were provided with **250,000 test strips** for glucometers.

 **Luhansk Prosthetic-Orthopaedic plant** was supported with **tools and consumables** for prosthetic-orthopedic production needs.


 Medical rooms of **37 educational institutions** were **equipped** with furniture, equipment, and tools to **improve basic health care**.

ECONOMIC SAFETY OF THE AFFECTED POPULATION

 Over **6000 tons of coal** were **delivered to 2505 households** in 67 settlements to ensure they had heating in their homes during the winter period.


 With the ICRC's support, **93 families** whose houses were damaged in frontline districts received furniture and home appliances and **12 households** with damaged heating systems due to the fighting received gas heaters with technical support to install them.

COVERING BASIC NEEDS OF THE VULNERABLE POPULATION


 Over **3000 bedridden people** in 19 districts **received non-food kits** that include oilcloth for mattresses, bed linen, blankets, disposable nappies, cleaning and hygiene materials, towels, rubber gloves and baby cream.


 Up to **9.7 tons of food and hygiene items** were distributed in bulk to **internally displaced people (IDPs)** and to affected populations in frontline villages.

MINE RISK AWARENESS

 More than **1000 adults and 400 children** were sensitized to **mine risk awareness** and **safer behaviour** through 59 awareness raising sessions and theatrical performances.


CARING FOR THE DEAD

 The ICRC provided **structural support to 13 forensic facilities** including the **Medico-Legal Bureau of Luhansk** with its **branch offices** in Schastie and Starobelsk. The facilities were **furnished and equipped** as well as provided with **2 stand-alone refrigerators** and other **equipment** to ensure adequate and **continuous work of the forensic service**.


 **Two laboratories** responsible for the examination of **unidentified dead bodies** as well as the **Search and Recovery Team** were supplied with furniture, equipment and other materials to carry out their services.


 The **Central Morgue of Luhansk** was **equipped** with 2 external refrigerators.

MAINTAINING FAMILY LINKS

 The ICRC continues to receive regular visits from **families of missing persons** and of **prisoners of war**.

SUPPORTING TO THE LOCAL RED CROSS IN LUHANSK

 The ICRC supports the local red cross in all the aspects of its operations, including capacity building of staff members and volunteers to provide certified care to the population, provision of essential office equipment and furniture, funding for visual materials, infrastructure improvements, strengthening of home-visiting nurse programs, and efficient vehicle maintenance. These programs aimed at improving the ability of the local red cross to provide important humanitarian services to communities and to meet their crucial needs.

 **12.6 tons of humanitarian aid** to the affected population was delivered by the local red cross with the support of the ICRC. The assistance included provision of food and non-food items covering essential needs, provision of equipment to schools for better access to education and carrying out home visiting nursing services to vulnerable population.
