

ZAMBOANGA CRISIS: A YEAR ON

On 9 September 2013, clashes broke out between a faction of the Moro National Liberation Front and government troops in Zamboanga City, south-west Philippines. Fighting stopped a month later, but humanitarian needs remain.

146,000 DISPLACED PERSONS provided with hot meals
82,500 DISPLACED PERSONS given food rations, household and hygiene items
10,000 WORKERS WITH INCOME through cash-for-work initiatives

40,000 DISPLACED PERSONS with cash grants for food and small businesses



Clean water and sanitation

78,000 PEOPLE IN EIGHT EVACUATION CENTRES given clean water

21,000 PEOPLE IN FIVE SITES continue to get clean water through trucking and support to ZCWD
108 LATRINES IN TWO SITES constructed/ under construction
DRAINAGE SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS at the stadium and Taluksangay site
LONG-TERM SOLUTIONS TO WATER SUPPLY coordinated with Zamboanga City Water District



Health care

19,000+ CONSULTATIONS at the stadium health-care unit from Sept. 2013-Aug. 2014
146 MEDICAL EVACUATIONS carried out with the PRC
50 WEAPON-WOUNDED PEOPLE treated with specialized supplies

SEVEN BARANGAY HEALTH STATIONS benefited from support to City Health Office
SUPPORT TO CHO MOBILE HEALTH TEAM in Mampang site (Masepla)
5,000 CHILDREN TO BE IMMUNIZED against measles and polio
THREE MULTIPURPOSE HALLS constructed/under construction for hygiene, health and nutrition activities
SUPPLIES AND MEDICINES PROVIDED to Zamboanga City Medical Center
1,000 DISPLACED PEOPLE AND RESIDENTS regained access to healthcare after rebuilding health station in Rio Hondo



Nutrition

OVER 200 MODERATELY MALNOURISHED CHILDREN and pregnant/ lactating women benefiting from feeding programme
3,000 MOST VULNERABLE FAMILIES received food, household and hygiene items to reduce risk of malnourishment

ICRC VISITS TO DETAINEES AND EFFORTS TO RESTORE CONTACT BETWEEN FAMILY MEMBERS



AROUND 300 DETAINEES receive visits from the ICRC to ensure proper treatment
160 FAMILY MEMBERS VISITED
61 DETAINED RELATIVES with arrangements made and travel allowance provided by ICRC
