
Operational Highlights: Donetsk and Luhansk



ENSURING LIFE-SAVING CARE AND OTHER HEALTH SERVICES











900 kg of tools and material were provided to support the local production of prosthetics-orthopedic parts.

Helping people with disabilities: 300+ people with disabilities benefited from transportation services supported by the ICRC; 800+ people received wheelchairs, walking aids as well as a pair of custom-made orthopedic footwear; 6 wheelchairs and 6 crutches were donated to hospitals.

BASIC NEEDS

18,200+ tonnes of coal were delivered to 7,355 households in 76 settlements near the frontline to help ensure heating during the winter period.

200,000+ people, including some 7,000 displaced persons and 300+ tuberculosis patients, received food parcels and hygiene kits.

12,000+ people in 15 temporary accommodation centers ('transition centers') benefitted from bulk food, hygiene items, dishware, and bedding.

9 IDP centres in 4 settlements were supported with bedding and household appliances.

16 hospitals benefitted from essential household items

and some 12,000 patients in 4 health-care facilities received diapers and bedlinen.

7 veterinary hospitals were supported with equipment to improve their work, especially for artificial insemination and vaccination for farming animals.

8.2 tonnes of furniture and electric appliances were donated to 13 social institutions; 4 social protection institutions and a nursing home in Mariupol received IT equipment, household appliances, furniture and bedlinen.

10,000 children in 508 schools received school kits with stationery items.

'Flexible' kits of furniture and home appliances provided to 93 families from frontline districts whose houses were heavily damaged received their choice of flexible kits.

12 households whose houses and heating systems were damaged were provided with gas heaters, radiators and installation works with materials.

15,000+ blankets were donated to some 13,000 households in 5 settlements.

Some 2,200 families in 7 settlements received candles and torches due to a power outage.

ESSENTIAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND EMERGENCY HOUSING RESPONSE

1,500,000 people benefited from water networks repair via ICRC support to Voda Donbassa: 2 transformers, 23 vehicles, 35 pumps, tools and equipment.

335,423 tonnes of assistance and 27 sqm of metal sheeting were provided to water boards, including one excavator, one water truck, 10+ km of pipes, fittings and roofings, and other materials to preserve access to water supply for the population.

1,430,000 litres of drinking water delivered for 48,000+ people in 25 health-care facilities, schools, and 9 settlements.

Rehabilitation of 8 educational institutions, 7 health-care facilities, and an anthropological laboratory; completed rehabilitation for one education complex and two schools.



+ 14.3 tonnes of materials and equipment, including 30 electric generators were provided to the Department of Emergency Situations.

11.5 tonnes of emergency housing materials were delivered to the affected population; some 72,800 people in some 13 settlements located near the frontline received similar support for quick fixes; 1,100 PVC windows and rehabilitation works were carried out for 182 people in

ACCESS TO EDUCATION & MINE RISK AWARENESS & PROTECTION



Children with disabilities at a local technical boarding school had their shared computer space furbished with IT equipment: 61 tablets, a computer, and a printer.



Education for 800+ children/students were supported with the provision of educational and stationery items, IT equipment, furniture, kitchenware, and musical equipment.



The **mine risk awareness** activities of EMERCOM was supported with an inflatable 48 m² tent, a generator, 2500 mine risk signs, 2500 wooden poles, 5 chainsaws, and other equipment such as grasscutters, hammers, pliers, hatchets, and screws.



800+ children in 6 educational institutions in Donetsk were sensitized to mine risks and safer behavior by Yunost Cultural Center and supported by the ICRC; an additional 10,000+ safety leaflets and 20,000 bookmarks.



M. Humanitarian demining activities by local entities were supported with 1,500+ mine risk awareness signs, 1,400 wooden poles, 4 risk awareness billboards, 77,000 metres of marking tape, technical equipment and tools.



The ICRC continues to receive regular visits from families of missing persons and prisoners of war.



300+ civilians affected by the international armed conflict have received financial assistance.

CARING FOR THE DEAD



27 forensics facilities tasked with search, recovery, and management of the dead were given various support such as 8 stand-alone refrigerators, 2 vehicles, body bags, special and office furniture, equipment, consumables, and personal protective equipment.



Search and Recovery teams were equipped with a special vehicle, furniture, equipment, tools, consumables, disinfectants, detergents and personal protective equipment to continue field operations during the winter and for working with mass graves, search & recovery, and information management.



3 laboratories tasked with examination of unidentified dead bodies were supported with reagents for examination, furniture, equipment and consumables.



Luhansk Medico-Legal Bureau was supported with furniture, equipment and tools, consumables and personal protective equipment for continuation of their work. The Central Morgue was also equipped with two external refrigerators.

SUPPORTING AND COORDINATING WITH MOVEMENT PARTNERS



12.6 tonnes of humanitarian aid delivered—at the request of the local red cross (10,000 blankets, 300 pillows, 250 packs of diapers, and bed linen)—to the affected population.



IDPs and frontline villages received some 9.7 tonnes of bulk food and hygiene bulk.



Pre-hospital medical kits were provided to 25 sub-units of the local red cross; fuel and maintenance of 4 red cross vehicles were supported by the ICRC.



24 branches of the local red cross in Luhansk have been supported with 25 heaters, year-long IT equipment & maintenance, structural rehabilitation projects, 90 sets of red cross uniform, stationery items, and even a foldable tent.



133 red cross volunteers received salary incentives and 200 kg of training material, first aid kits, and disinfectants to deliver humanitarian services such as working in heating points and supporting activities of the local red cross.



67 Risk Awareness and Safer Behavior sessions reached 1,400+ people by local red cross volunteers.



Info-as-Aid and stationery material were provided to the local red cross: 5000 leaflets, 200 notepads, 200 calendars, 318 pens and 200 plastic bags with the logo.



240 beneficiaries received services from the 41 patronage nurses that are supported by the ICRC.



390 children reached with 71 IDEAS boxes activities conducted with the support of local red cross volunteers; 13 IDEAS boxes kits were provided to 13 local red cross





Lisichansk school in Luhansk were supported with 2 generators and 4,800 litres of bottled water.
