

# ICRC OPERATION IN MYANMAR

**JANUARY TO JUNE 2025** 



The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) is an independent, neutral and impartial humanitarian organization. Its mandate to assist and protect people affected by armed conflict and other situations of violence, and to promote respect for international humanitarian law (IHL) is universally recognized under the Geneva Conventions.

The ICRC has been present in Myanmar for nearly 40 years, promoting IHL and delivering humanitarian assistance in close proximity to affected communities. Activities are carried out in the states of Kachin, Kayin, Mon, Rakhine, and Shan, as well as in the Mandalay Region, in response to needs arising from conflict, violence, and other humanitarian consequences. Following the 28 March earthquake, the ICRC adapted and expanded its operations to meet additional needs, while continuing to respond to the ongoing consequences of armed conflict and violence, in close coordination with the Myanmar Red Cross Society (MRCS) and other Red Cross Red Crescent Movement partners.

This document provides an overview of the ICRC's humanitarian activities across Myanmar during the first half of 2025, in response to the needs of people affected by armed conflict, violence, and natural disasters.

# HELPING AFFECTED PEOPLE MEET THEIR ESSENTIAL NEEDS



**67,544 people** received seeds, farm tools and organic fertilizers to grow staple crops and vegetables.



**1,358 people** received support to start or resume their livelihood activities and small business initiatives.



**49,218 people** received fuel sticks, and stoves for cooking.



**20,758** people were provided with food rations.



**29,683 people** received support to purchase their daily essentials.



**1,176 people** earned income through various work programmes.



**33,693 people** were provided with essential household items such as blankets, mosquito nets, kitchen sets, dignity kits and hygiene kits to improve their living conditions.



**46 people** were trained to sharpen their skills in farming and livestock breeding.



**8,760 people** benefited from livestock vaccination and treatment campaigns, through support to community animal health workers.

# IMPROVING ACCESS TO WATER, SANITATION AND SHELTER



**131,109 people** benefitted from improved access to water, sanitation, adequate hygiene and shelter within the ICRC response operations.



**2,628 people** living in rural areas of the ICRC's operational regions gained better access to water, sanitation and shelter.



**100,000 people** living in urban areas of the ICRC's operational regions benefited from the repair of the water distribution system.



11 hospitals, 39 health clinics and 1 physical rehabilitation centre received support to renovate their facilities and safe-drinking water supply.

### **HEALTH**



**7,982** patients were transferred or transported by the ICRC supported responders for urgent medical care.



**319 people** participated in First Aid and Pre-Hospital Emergency Care Training sessions.



**5,915** people were treated by the ICRC supported responders.



18 First Aid and Prehospital Emergency Care trainings were organized by the ICRC.



704 conflict-affected patients in need of medical care received support with their medical expenses.

### PHYSICAL REHABILITATION



**3,379 people** with disabilities, including **918 people** affected by explosive hazards were supported through our physical rehabilitation programme.



1,712 prosthetic feet were produced.



**82 people** participated in disability inclusion training.



**315 people** with disabilities received small repairment services from ICRC trained repairmen.



**249 people** with disabilities participated in adaptative sports programmes at the physical rehabilitation centres.



**23 people** with disabilities received support

for their education, while **11 people** with disabilities received support to start small business initiatives.



**372 people** with disabilities benefited from

4 mobile repair missions conducted by the Hpa-an Orthopaedic Rehabilitation Centre (HORC) mobile repair workshop team.

# MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT (MHPSS)



**38 people**, including first responders from CSOs and IDP camp leaders who are serving their communities, received direct mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS).



**566 people** in need of physical rehabilitation at ICRC-supported centres in Myitkyina and Hpa-an received mental health and psychosocial support.

### **RESTORING FAMILY LINKS**



**3,398 people** were provided with support upon release from prison, allowing them to return home with dignity.



1,813 Red Cross
Messages with family
news were exchanged between
separated family members.



**1,604 people** received support to visit their detained loved ones.



Families of 336
people were helped to identify the whereabouts of their loved ones.

# **EXPLOSIVE HAZARD RISK AWARENESS AND PROMOTING SAFE BEHAVIOUR**



**2,831 people** learned more about the risk of explosive hazards and received information on safer practices through awareness sessions organized by community volunteers.



17,787 people learned more about the risks of explosive hazards and received information on safer practices through 421 awareness sessions organized by Red Cross Volunteers



**6,621** people learned more about the risks of explosive hazards and received information on safer practices through **187** awareness sessions organized by the ICRC.

### WORKING WITH MYANMAR RED CROSS SOCIETY



A total of **6,700** visibility

**items** such as banners, flags, vests, aprons, and caps were produced and provided to the MRCS for their staff and volunteers to use.



**3 MRCS branch offices** were renovated with the support from the ICRC.



**1,223** Red Cross

Volunteers participated in 42
Safer Access Framework
training sessions organized by
the MRCS and supported by the ICRC.



230 Red Cross Volunteers
participated in 9 First Aid for
Emergency Response and

Preparedness Training sessions, financially supported by the ICRC.



**3** peer educator trainings

were organized, and **27** youth volunteers were trained as Safer Access Framework peer educators.



**12** MRCS ambulances

received support to ensure continuous Emergency Ambulance Services.

# PROMOTING INTERNATIONAL HUMANITARIAN LAW



**962 people** (weapon bearers, government staff, religious and community leaders, academic circle and Myanmar Red Cross Society branch leaders and volunteers) participated in **40 IHL related meeting or awareness sessions**.

### **BUILDING COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**



Over 9,000 people, including armed carriers, civil society organizations, religious circle members, government staff, MRCS staff and communities learned more about the ICRC mandate, its principles and working modalities through 280 general awareness sessions.



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
