

#### **HEALTH FACILITIES**

(primary health centers, hospitals, and casualty collection points) received material, technical, and financial support.



#### **CONSULTATIONS**

(including 22,472 antenatal care consultations) were conducted in all ICRC-supported health facilities.

#### **OF DRINKING WATER**

were donated to a field hospital.



#### **OF DIESEL FUEL**

were donated to 4 hospitals.

were performed in all supported hospitals.

were admitted to three hospitals fully supported by the ICRC.

As part of ICRC's efforts to strengthen health care in detention, the ICRC inaugurated a new medical clinic, constructed on a  $350m^2$  plot in Sa'ada new remand prison to serve over 900 detainees.

# PHYSICAL REHABILITATION PROGRAM



#### **SERVICES**

were provided to people with disabilities in 5 ICRC-supported physical rehabilitation centers (PRCs) and 2 wheelchair service structures in 5 governorates.

with disabilities benefited from the ICRC's social inclusion activities, such as wheelchair basketball and tennis training sessions and career development programs.

#### **DEVICES**

#### **STAFF MEMBERS**

in 5 PRCs, 2 wheelchair service structures and one training institute were supported with monthly incentives.







#### CONSTRUCTION AND REHABILITATION PROJECTS

were conducted in various facilities, including health facilities, water facilities, and places of detention.

# **PROTECTION**



#### **DETAINEES**

in 5 places of detention benefited from assistance distribution by the ICRC to ensure adequate living conditions.



#### UNIDENTIFIED/UNCLAIMED HUMAN REMAINS

were temporarily buried by the concerned authorities as part of the ICRC's support for the emergency decongestion of mortuaries. Additionally, 60 deceased migrants were buried with dignity by their community of origin, with the support of the ICRC.



#### **FAMILY CONTACT SERVICES**

were provided, including Red Cross Messages (RCMs), Salamat Messages, Safe & Well messages, phone calls, and video calls, between separated families, including detainees and their families.

#### ATTESTATIONS OF FORMER DETAINEES

were released by the concerned authorities with the support of the ICRC.



#### RED CROSS MESSAGES

were distributed and the fate of 28 missing individuals was clarified.


