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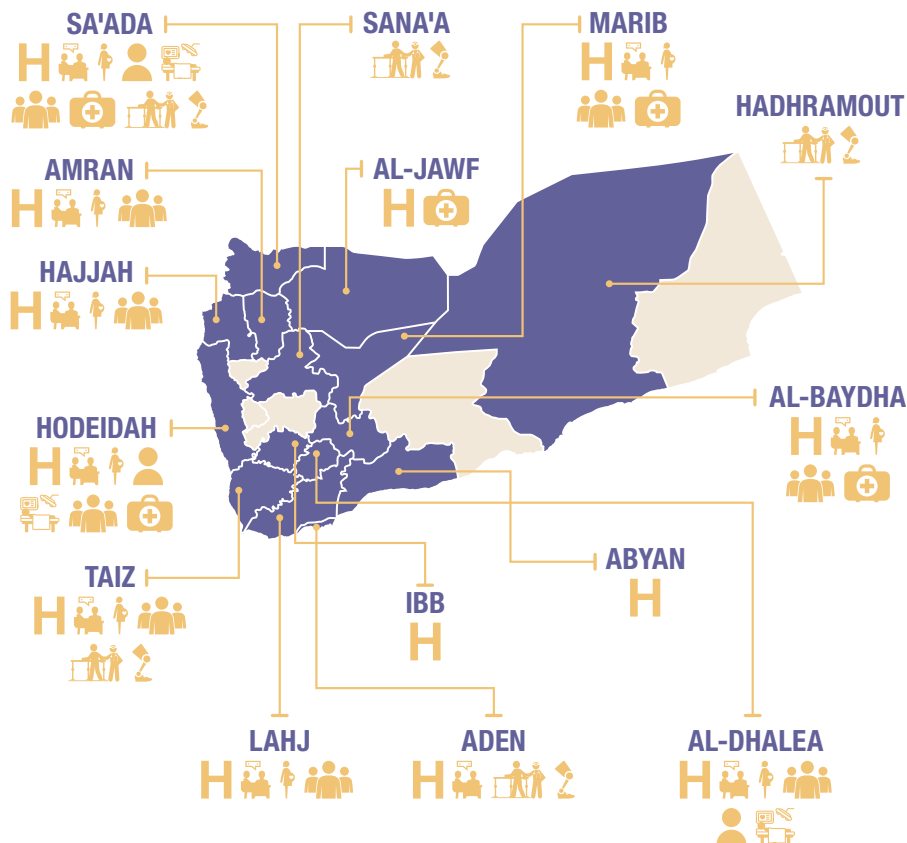

were screened to address global acute malnutrition (GAM), with 14,778 diagnosed with GAM.

were donated to different health facilities.

were admitted to three hospitals fully supported by the ICRC.

As part of ICRC's efforts to strengthen health care in detention, the ICRC inaugurated a new medical clinic, constructed on a 350m² plot in Sa'ada new remand prison to serve over 900 detainees.

were treated in 15 ICRC-supported hospitals.

PHYSICAL REHABILITATION PROGRAM

SERVICES

in 5 PRCs, 2 wheelchair service structures and one training institute were supported with monthly incentives.



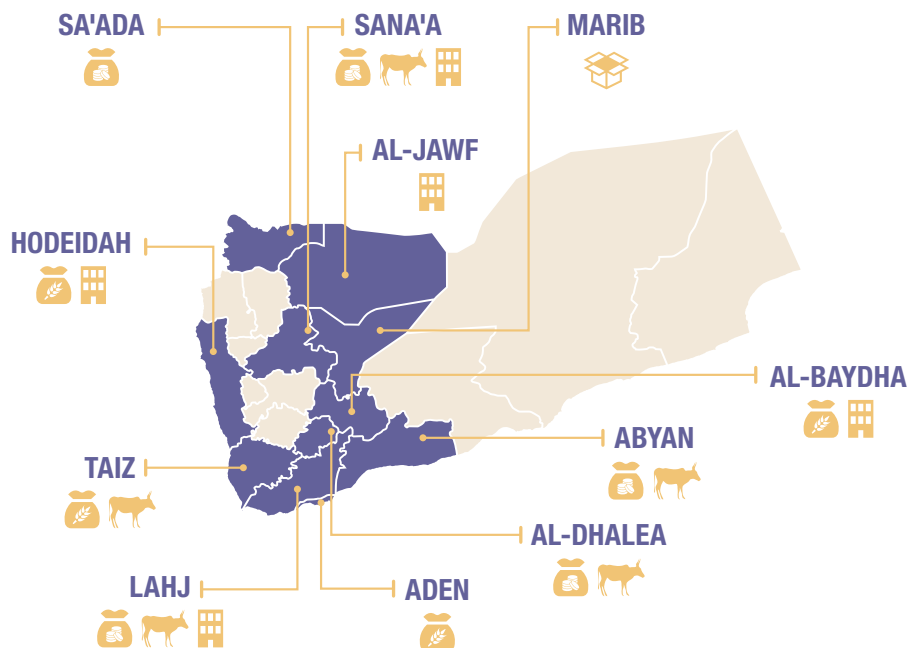

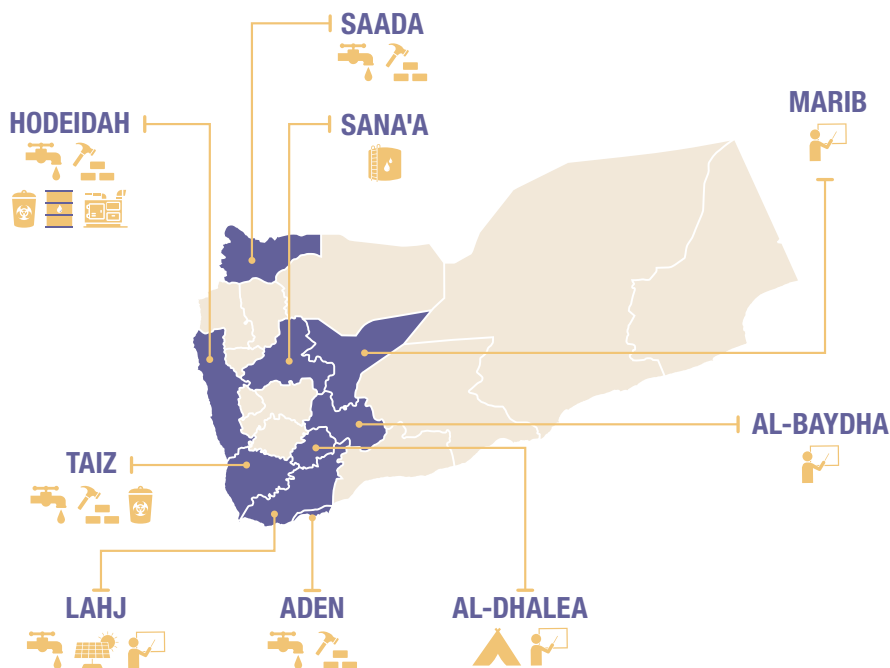

TENTS

were donated and installed by the ICRC at a cholera treatment unit in one governorate.



A YRCS staff member oversees a water pumping test in Lahj after the ICRC-supported rehabilitation of the Karesh Water Supply System in Al Qabbayta District, which included upgrading the solar power system (19.6 kW), installing a new submersible pump, and establishing a water distribution network.



An ICRC forensic analyst oversees and documents the dignified temporary burial of unidentified remains in Hodeidah, as part of the ICRC's support for the authorities in Sana'a and Aden to help ease morgue congestion and ensure traceability of the human remains for future identification.

DETAINEES

in 5 places of detention benefited from assistance distribution by the ICRC to ensure adequate living conditions.



323

UNIDENTIFIED/UNCLAIMED HUMAN REMAINS

were temporarily buried by the concerned authorities as part of the ICRC's support for the emergency decongestion of mortuaries. Additionally, 60 deceased migrants were buried with dignity by their community of origin, with the support of the ICRC.

FAMILY CONTACT SERVICES

were provided, including Red Cross Messages (RCMs), Salamat Messages, Safe & Well messages, phone calls, and video calls, between separated families, including detainees and their families.

RED CROSS MESSAGES

were distributed and the fate of 28 missing individuals was clarified.



211

ATTESTATIONS OF DETENTION

were issued by the ICRC to help individuals confirm and document their periods of detention.



160

FORMER DETAINEES

were released by the concerned authorities with the support of the ICRC.



22

DETENTION VISITS

were conducted to 14 places of detention around the country to ensure adequate living conditions, family contact, and dignified treatment of detainees.

MEDICOLEGAL INSTITUTIONS/ PARTNERS

received donations of materials to ensure the dignified management of the dead, including body bags, body tags, and other personal protective equipment.



7

TRAININGS

were conducted for 69 participants from concerned authorities and relevant institutions, covering topics such first aid, search and recovery, photography and documentation, and management of the dead.

SQUARE METERS

contaminated by landmines and explosive ordnance have been cleared by the Yemen Executive Mine Action Centre (YEMAC) with the technical and financial support of the ICRC.

TECHNICAL WEC TRAININGS

were conducted by the ICRC for YEMAC and YRCS staff, equipping 70 personnel with enhanced knowledge on emergency response and risk awareness programming.

YEMAC STAFF

were financially supported by the ICRC to enable the continued implementation of clearance and survey activities.



20

BODY BAGS

were donated by the ICRC to YEMAC to support the safe and dignified recovery of human remains during clearance operations.

LAPTOPS

were donated by the ICRC to YEMAC staff to support data management, operational efficiency, and improved reporting.

PEOPLE

affected by the armed conflict, including those injured by landmines and explosive ordnance, received cash assistance from the ICRC to improve their access to essential health services.

STAFF SAFETY SESSIONS

focusing on airstrike prevention and protection were conducted, benefitting 120 staff members from the ICRC and partner national societies.



2

VEHICLES

were donated by the ICRC to YEMAC to improve the mobility of the clearance teams and facilitate safe and timely field operations.

PERSONAL EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS KITS

were distributed by the ICRC to 12 YRCS branches and headquarters in support of YRCS disaster response teams.

YRCS VOLUNTEERS & STAFF MEMBERS

attended different ICRC-supported training including explosive ordnance risk education, safer behavior, vulnerability and capacity assessment, branch disaster response team training, and mine risk education.

AIRSTRIKE EMERGENCY INTERVENTIONS

in response to airstrikes, including search and rescue, first aid, and ambulance transfers, were carried out by YRCS Emergency Response Teams with ICRC support.

EMERGENCY INTERVENTIONS

in response to natural disasters, including fires, gas explosions, and floods, were carried out by YRCS Emergency Response Teams with ICRC support.

YRCS STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS

received monthly salaries and incentives from the ICRC.

COMMUNITY DISASTER RESPONSE TEAM TRAININGS

were conducted by 4 YRCS branches with the support of the ICRC.

YRCS AMBULANCES & VEHICLES

were supported by the ICRC with fuel and maintenance to ensure continued emergency response and humanitarian services.

YRCS BRANCHES AND SUBBRANCHES

were supported with operational running costs and provision of oil for their vehicles and ambulances.

received Emergency Response Funds from the ICRC to strengthen their operational capacity for timely deployment and assistance during emergencies.

were conducted with different media outlets to shed light on the humanitarian situation in Yemen and the ICRC's response.

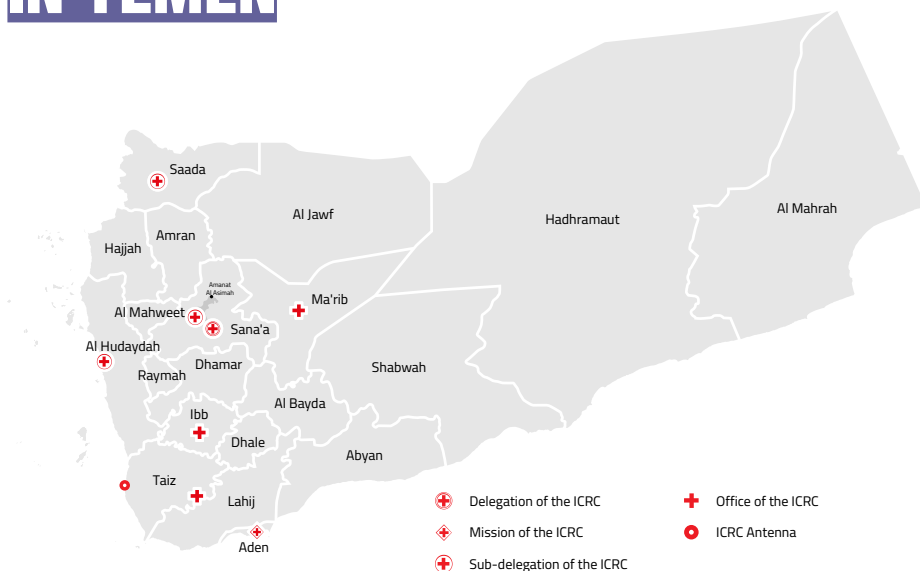
