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FACTS AND FIGURES 2025:

During 2025, the International Committee for the Red Cross (ICRC) teams provided technical and material support to authorities and local actors; assisted communities in dire need; acted as a neutral intermediary and continued to engage in bilateral and confidential dialogue with relevant parties to strengthen protection mechanisms for the people affected by conflict and violence, thus putting neutral, impartial and independent humanitarian response in concrete action.

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PREVENTION / PROTECTION:

190 Lebanese Armed Forces (LAF) officers were trained in key International Humanitarian Law principles (IHL).

85 judges from the Ministry of Justice, staff from the Ministry of Culture and members of the NCIHL received awareness sessions on IHL.

Provided institutional support to NCIHL through office furnishing and the provision of essential equipment to strengthen their operational capacity. Facilitated the participation of interlocutors in regional and international events to build their capacity on IHL and advance engagement with the Global IHL Initiative.

The LAF's Directorate for IHL/IHRL was supported on an ongoing basis, especially its network of Legal Advisors, providing technical and material support for IHL dissemination activities for academia and journalists.

Provided technical trainings to the ISF, IHS, and to EMS agencies on the "Management of the Dead" to enhance their capacities to respond to mass fatalities.

Even though a large-scale PFL emergency was avoided thanks to maintained connectivity throughout the country, the ICRC continued to follow up on the cases of Lebanese detained in ILOT, carrying out four repatriation operations across the border, for a total of 9 individuals. At the same time, case collection and follow-up on Syria and Lebanese Civil War-related disappearances continued, with BRS collection resuming after the ceasefire.

The MHPSS accompaniment program for Syrian families of missing continued, along with cash and voucher assistance support and continued work on the Need to Know.

Efforts to support and operationalize the National Commission for the Missing and Forcibly Disappeared intensified after the renewal of the Commission's mandate, with increased focus on strengthening its data management and protection systems.

Focus group discussions were held as part of a community-based project in the Palestinian refugee camp of Ein el-Helwe to understand the community's needs and what support would help them strengthen their resilience in the event of another escalation or other situations of violence.

| Emergency Medical Services (EMS) agencies received essential material donations.

| The Public Health Emergency Operation Center (PHEOC) of the Ministry of Public Health benefited from technical guidance on the management of the dead in emergencies.

| **2** family reunifications were facilitated for an unaccompanied minor. | **9** Red Cross Messages (RCMs) were collected, **23** distributed, and **5** Safe and well messages delivered.

| **9** mental health and psychosocial support sessions were provided, and **5** social activities were organized for families of the missing.

DETENTION:

| **94** RCMs were collected and **10** distributed, helping families stay connected. | **17** places of detention were visited regularly to monitor living conditions.

| **121** representations or disseminations on the protection of civilian population.

WATER & HABITAT:

| **17** places of detention in Lebanon were supported with better ventilation, water, power, tools, and consumables, benefiting **5,684** detainees.

| **10** hospitals with a total of **1,230** beds were supported to ensure operational continuity and improved passive security.

| **4** PHCs were supported to ensure operational continuity and improved passive security allowing **614** consultations.



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- | Rehabilitated water pumping stations in South Lebanon and the Bekaa Valley, restoring reliable access to safe water for communities living in conflict-affected areas.
- | Rehabilitated damaged infrastructure in the Haret Hreik neighborhood, improving access to essential services and supporting the return of affected residents.
- | Installed backup generators in water pumping stations in South Lebanon and the Bekaa Valley, helping maintain uninterrupted water supply despite electricity shortages.
- | Completed the first phase of rehabilitation of the Wazzani and Maissat pumping stations, strengthening water supply systems serving the cazas of Marjayoun and Bint Jbeil.
- | Supported water establishments across Lebanon, contributing to the continuity and resilience of public water services in conflict-affected regions.
- | Improved conditions in collective shelters, enhancing access to water, electricity, and hygiene facilities for displaced families.
- | Carried out safety improvements and rapid rehabilitation works at Chmistar Secondary School, restoring a safer learning environment after repeated damage to the facility.
- | Implemented repairs and maintenance works in several primary health care centers, improving access to essential health services for conflict-affected populations.

ECONOMIC SECURITY:

- | Communities most affected by the escalation of conflict in 2024 received two rounds of in-kind assistance, followed by multipurpose cash assistance.

| **81,725** individuals received multipurpose cash assistance, one-off or over a period of 3 to 6 months.

- | Constructed a new primary health care center and rehabilitated the main emergency department at Tripoli Governmental Hospital, strengthening the hospital's capacity to respond to medical needs.



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Upgraded critical utilities at Marjayoun and Tibnin Governmental Hospitals, supporting the continuity of hospital services following the end of hostilities.

Completed a multi-year rehabilitation project at Rafik Hariri University Hospital, improving operational capacity and access to health care for vulnerable communities.

HEALTH:

10 villages were covered by the Mobile Medical Unit in Marjayoun. | **26** EMS stations, **32** hospitals, and **5** places of detention received donations to improve access to health services.

160 healthcare professionals received training at the RHUH Training Center. | **45** detainees benefited from direct health support.

115 EMS providers and hospital staff received training in emergency care to enhance trauma care.

459 individuals received mental health support sessions.

80 university students were trained in amputee rehabilitation, **5** Lebanese Red Cross staff were trained in wheelchair services, and **40** persons with disabilities benefited from the Career Development Program.

472 frontline workers participated in Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) trainings and Help the Helpers sessions.

7,624 inpatients indirectly benefited from ICRC-provided essential medications, supplies, and biomedical equipment.



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COOPERATION:

Provided support to the Lebanese Red Cross Emergency Medical Response and Blood Transfusion Services to strengthen their operational capacity and service delivery, including support to dispatch centers, EMS & BTS stations, vehicles, maintenance, fuel, and other essential running costs.

Provided support to the Safer Access program in implementing SAF awareness sessions at EMS stations located on the frontline and most impacted during the last escalation.

Movement

3 operational briefings were held with the LRC, IFRC, Palestinian Red Crescent Lebanon Branch, and **14** Partner National Societies.

Lebanese Red Cross

14K food parcels were donated to LRC to increase their emergency preparedness and response capacity.

49 EMS stations received support for salaries, fuel, vehicle maintenance, equipment, day-shift coverage, and volunteer training, while

20 new ambulances and **1,587** flak jackets were added to enhance the fleet.

13 Blood Transfusion Stations received equipment, vehicles, blood bags/reagents, maintenance, and staff salaries.

+35 EMS stations received financial support for awareness sessions, and a risk assessment workshop was held to develop a new LRC security plan.

Palestinian Red Crescent in Lebanon

165.5K L of fuel and a supply of medicines were delivered to 10 Palestinian Red Crescent Lebanon health structures.



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
