Humanitarian protection

3000

Individuals benefited from the ICRC's neutral intermediary role facilitating civilians' safer access to exposed fields to plant, harvest, and repair vital infrastructures.



Missing in relation to the conflict

2170

Biological reference samples related to 775 missing persons were collected from their relatives to facilitate future identification of exhumed remains.

1370

Relatives of missing people drew psychosocial support from commemoration events, and individual home visits. 269 individuals received emotional support at the collection point during the BRSC.



Armed & Security Forces

1113

Servicemen and cadets of AZ army participated in briefings and events related to the ICRC and IHL.

100

Attendees of Strategic Research and State Defense Management Course, high ranking officers representing different operational departments of MoD and deputies of unit commanders were presented ICRC activities and IHL Integration into military operations.

36

Officers were certified as trainers of IHL.

16

Deputy Heads of Police stations from 16 FL districts participated in dissemination session on ICRC mandate and activities.

MoD representatives participated in Dead Body Management training.



Weapon Contamination

2023

Individuals from 24 communities increased resilience to weapon contamination through briefings, forum theaters on preparedness and safer behavior. 532 mine risk awareness and safer behavior posters that were distributed in 14 FL communities.



Water & Habitat

2941

Individuals restored or improved their access to water with the ICRC support in upgrading the water supply infrastructure.

1600

Individuals benefited from upgraded irrigation water supply.



Economic Security

2257

Households in 9 communities received agro or livestock inputs (seeds and fertilizers) to improve their livelihoods.

231

Individuals in 7 districts (including 3 mine victims) saw their income increased thanks to cash transfers for MEI or CFW activities.



Health Care

236

Individuals from frontline communities were trained in first aid with the AzRCS support.

83

Volunteers of four AzRCS EMVTs, 35 ambulance staff of Aghdash hospital, and 22 rescuers of MoES participated in first aid trainings.

22

MoD and MoH doctors participated in a War Surgery Course.

20

Doctors of MoD operating in frontline hospitals and 24 medical staff of Agdash Hospital participated in Emergency Room Trauma Course. 32 medical staff of Agdash hospital participated in Emergency care workshops.



Detention

336

RCMs were collected and 269 distributed.

88

Visits were carried out to 45 places of detention to monitor treatment and conditions of detention and to support family contacts.



Cooperation with AzRCS

AzRCS EMVT members increased their capacity through various trainings and workshops (first aid, communication, MHPSS, movement orientation, etc.).

First aid posts have been organized by EMVT members. Residents in affected communities were sensitized on basic first aid techniques.
