THE INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE OF THE RED CROSS IN YEMEN

The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) is a humanitarian, impartial, neutral and independent organization working to protect and assist victims of armed conflicts and other situations of violence. It responds to the needs of the most vulnerable and at the same time promotes respect for International Humanitarian Law and supports authorities to introduce these rules into national law.

Present in Yemen since 1962, the ICRC monitors the treatment and living conditions of detainees, restores contact between family members who have been separated by the fighting, works to ascertain the fate of missing persons and assists authorities in the management of persons killed during fighting and the return of their remains to their respective families. It monitors the conduct of hostilities and encourages all parties to the ongoing conflict through dialogue to strengthen the protection of civilians. It provides displaced persons and their host communities with emergency aid and support in restoring their livelihoods. It supports primary healthcare and hospital services; the physical rehabilitation of mine victims and other persons with traumatic injuries; and repairs water, health and prison infrastructure. In so doing, it coordinates closely with its partner organization in Yemen, the Yemen Red Crescent Society (YRCS).

The Red Cross and Red Crescent emblems are symbols of humanity and humanitarian work. In times of armed conflict, these emblems can be used to ensure safety of medical services of the armed forces, civil medical workers, and Red Cross and Red Crescent staff members, their facilities and vehicles.






